Pamela Ballinger is Professor of History and the Fred Cuny Chair in the History of Human Rights at the University of Michigan. She holds degrees in Anthropology
(B.A. Stanford University, M. Phil Cambridge University, M.A. Johns Hopkins University) and a joint Ph.D. in Anthropology and History (Johns Hopkins). She is the author of *History in Exile: Memory and Identity at the Borders of the Balkans* (Princeton, 2003), *La Memoria dell'Esilio* (Veltro, 2010), and the *World Refugees Made: Decolonization and the Foundation of Postwar Italy* (Cornell, 2020). She has published in a wide range of journals, including *Austrian History Yearbook, Comparative Studies in Society and History, Contemporary European History, Current Anthropology, Journal of Contemporary History, Journal of Modern Italian Studies, Journal of Refugee Studies, Journal of Tourism History*, and *Past and Present*.

Ballinger's work has received support from the American Academy in Rome (Rome Prize), American Council for Learned Societies, Center for Advanced Study in Behavioral Sciences (Stanford), Fulbright, Marie Curie/Freiburg Institute for Advanced Studies, National Science Foundation, and SSRC-MacArthur, among others. She is currently at work on two book projects: *An Intimate Sea: Sovereignties, Cartographies and Nature along the Modern Adriatic* and *Materializing Mussolini's Mediterranean: Infrastructures of Fascist Empire.*
