

Charles Bartlett is a historian of the Roman legal tradition, particularly in antiquity and the early modern period. He is especially interested in the history of the corporation and the institutional and intellectual environments in which political economy took shape. He received his Ph.D. in Ancient History from Harvard University; his dissertation examined the formation of Roman property law, and argued that the first-order characteristics of Roman property owe more to the pressures of imperial administration and economic development than to the rumination of professional jurists. He pursued a degree in ancient history in order to better understand the emergence of the Roman legal system whose revival and elaboration had such an impact on the early modern world. He was subsequently a postdoctoral associate in the Department of History and School of Law at Duke University and was Lauro de Bosis Fellow in the Departments of History and of the Classics at Harvard before joining the University of Miami in 2021.
