

Dr. Tamar M. Boyadjian is an Associate Professor of Medieval Literature, Poetry & Translation Studies in the Department of English at Michigan State University. Her academic research and publications primarily focus on the intersections between Europe and the Middle East across the Medieval Mediterranean, with a specific focus on the Arabo-Islamic world and the Armenian Kingdom of Cilicia. Further research interests include: Queer studies across the Medieval Mediterranean, Jerusalem in medieval literature; the crusades and crusading literature; medieval theology and historiography; women and lamentation in medieval Mediterranean literature, and city laments. She has published widely on these topics in academic journals, periodicals, and contributed to many book chapters. She is also the author of *The City Lament: Jerusalem Across the Medieval Mediterranean* (Cornell UP, 2018). As a poet who composes in Western Armenian, her works have also been published in a number of literary journals, creative anthologies, and international volumes around the world. She has authored, *it is what it is* (Andares, 2015), and *the vineyard of mirrors* (forthcoming, 2020). As a translator, she has done extensive work in translating from Armenian to English and German, and is the editor of the only two volumes of translation from Armenian to English: *makukachu* and *Unscripted: An Armenian Palimpsest* (Ingnakir, 2017), and *Unscripted: An Armenian Palimpsest [Absinthe: World Literature in Translation]* (University of Michigan Press, 2017).
