Gary Farney is an associate professor of History at Rutgers University-Newark. His publishing and research interests are in the areas of Roman Republican and early Imperial ancient ethnic and other group identity and in the material culture of ancient Italy. In addition to a variety of articles on Roman history and archaeology, his first book project was *Ethnic Identity and Aristocratic Competition in the Roman Republic* (CUP 2007). His current book project is entitled *Communicating Identity in Republican and early Imperial Rome*. Prof. Farney is the Editor-in Chief of the *Journal of Ancient History* and he is the Co-Director of an archaeological field project in central Italy, the Upper Sabina Tiberina Project; the focus of that project is current the excavation of a Roman villa site at Vacone in Lazio, for which he has operated an archaeological field school via Rutgers since 2012. He is also the Co-Director of the Mediterranean Displacements Project, an interdisciplinary working group of faculty across the university whose work centers on questions of migration, displacement, refugees and climate change in the Mediterranean, both historically and in the present. Since July 1, 2021, he has also become the Director for the Division of Global Affairs at Rutgers-Newark.
