Jacob Henke is a first year doctoral student in the University of Minnesota's Department of History. A graduate of the Classical and Near Eastern studies program at Minnesota, Jacob went on to earn his master's degree in Late Antique and Byzantine Studies at the University of Oxford. His academic interests lie at the intersection of the European, Levantine, and Asiatic contexts. In addition to exile and the diasporic religious communities of late antiquity and the early medieval period, his thematic interests include notions of heresy, the development of gnostic and apocalyptic literature, magic, mysticism, and the tumultuous shaping of religious identity in a world shifting between paganism, diverse Christianities, and Islam.
