

Joel Pattison

Joel Pattison is Assistant Professor of History at Williams College in Massachusetts. He is a historian of the medieval western Mediterranean, with a particular interest in trade and travel between Genoa and the Maghrib in the later Middle Ages, and the intersection of religious law and economic practice. He obtained his PhD at the University of California, Berkeley in 2019 and held the Rome Prize in Medieval Studies in 2019–2020. At Berkeley, his dissertation was supported by a Fulbright Award in Italy, and a Council of American Overseas Research Center grant in Morocco and Tunisia. Before accepting his current position at Williams, he lectured at UCLA and the University of Pennsylvania, and has several articles either published or forthcoming, including in the *Journal of Medieval Worlds*, the *Journal of North African Studies*, and *Speculum*. He is currently preparing his first book for publication, an adaptation of his dissertation, tentatively entitled “Trade and Religious Boundaries in the Medieval Maghrib: Genoese Merchants, their Products, and Islamic Law.”
