Johannes Makar is a PhD Candidate in Department of Near Eastern Languages and Civilizations (NELC) at Harvard University. His research interests lie in the social and intellectual histories of Orthodox Christian communities in the Eastern Mediterranean. In his dissertation, Johannes examines how Coptic intellectuals responded and contributed to reformist currents in late Ottoman Egypt.

At Harvard, Johannes has served as a Teaching Fellow in courses on modern Middle Eastern history, Islamic intellectual thought, and Arabic. Since 2018, he has also coordinated the Research Methods in Islamic Studies Workshop for the Alwaleed Islamic Studies Program (AISP).
