She is currently working on:

*Early Medieval Italy*, a book offering an overview of early medieval Italy from the Ostrogoths through the investiture controversy which integrates the histories of different regions of Italy which are generally treated separately: northern and southern Italy (including Sicily), and Lombard, Byzantine, and Muslim territories.
