

Olatunde is presently a Lisa Maskel PhD Fellow at the Department of History, University of Ghana. His primary research area is Deportations involving Nigeria, 1914-2020. Olatunde is also currently a junior Faculty at the Department of History and Diplomatic Studies, OOU, Nigeria. Taiwo delivered a paper on deportation at the University of Duisburg, Germany in July, 2022. In April, October, and November 2019, Olatunde separately conducted archival investigations at the Gerald Ford Presidential Library/University of Michigan, the Friends Library Swarthmore College (SC) (Philadelphia), and Robert Dole Institute of Politics /University of Kansas. Olatunde has been awarded fellowships from the Gerda Henkel Stiftung; G.R. Ford Presidential Foundation; & SC.
