

Matteo di Giovanni is an assistant professor of medieval philosophy at the University of Turin. He received his Ph.D. in philosophy at the Scuola Normale Superiore in Pisa, and a second Ph.D. in Graeco-Arabic and Islamic Studies from Yale University. His research interests focus on the Aristotelian tradition from antiquity to the Islamic world, the textual history of Aristotelianism and the Graeco-Arabic transmission of Aristotle, Averroes and philosophy in Islamic Spain. His published work includes *Averroè* (Carocci, 2017) and *Interpreting Averroes: Critical Essays* (Cambridge University Press, 2019), coedited with Peter Adamson.
