Michelle Armstrong-Partida is an Associate Professor of History at Emory University. She specializes in the study of gender, sexuality, and women's history in Iberia and the Mediterranean. She is the author of *Defiant Priests: Domestic Unions, Violence, and Clerical Masculinity in Fourteenth-Century Catalunya* (Cornell, 2017), co-editor of *Women & Community in Medieval and Early Modern Iberia* (2020), and has written on clandestine marriage, illegitimacy, as well as gang rape and adolescent masculinity. Her current book project is a comparative study of concubinous unions across the Mediterranean among Christian and Muslim merchants as well as migrant laborers in port cities. She has also embarked on a collaborative project on singlewomen—both enslaved and free—in the late medieval Mediterranean with fellow medievalist Susan McDonough and together they have written articles on women who lived on the spectrum of singleness, prostitute-concubines, and laboring class masculinity.
