

Hannah Barker is an assistant professor of medieval history at Arizona State University. She studies connections between the Black Sea and the Mediterranean during the thirteenth through fifteenth centuries, especially the slave trade which flourished during this period and the transmission of plague leading to the Black Death. Her book, *That Most Precious Merchandise: The Mediterranean Trade in Black Sea Slaves, 1260-1500*, was published in 2019. It received the Paul E. Lovejoy Prize and the ASU Institute for Humanities Research book prize, as well as honorable mentions for the Mediterranean Seminar's Wadjih F. al-Hamwi Prize and the Middle East Medievalists book prize. Her interests include the role of physicians in slave markets; forms of resistance by enslaved people; how medieval Italian notaries described slaves and voiced their statements in legal acts; Mamluk comparisons between northern and southern barbarians; plague transmission to Alexandria; and local slaving patterns in the Golden Horde and Caucasus regions.
