

Maria Hadjipolycarpou is Lecturer in Modern Greek Studies at the University of Illinois. She holds a Ph.D. in Comparative Literature from the University of Michigan. Before coming to Illinois she taught at Columbia University (2014-2017) and at The City University of New York, Queens College (2017-2019). The Mediterranean remains her main focus and region of interest with a particular emphasis on the Eastern Mediterranean, the Levant, and the relation of Greeks with Europe, Africa, and the Middle East. She was a 2016-2017 Visiting Fellow at the Center for European and Mediterranean Studies at New York University. She is co-founder of Mediterranean Topographies, an interdisciplinary research coalition interested in modern and early modern Mediterranean culture, literature, language, society, architecture, art, and history.
