

Originally from North Wales, Sarah Whitear is a doctoral candidate at the KU Leuven in Belgium working on a project funded by the Flemish Research Council (FWO). Her PhD research focuses on the interpretation and utilisation of the Levitical laws about menstruation and the New Testament story of the haemorrhaging woman in early Christian writings and she is particularly interested in how early Christians adopted, rejected or reframed ideas of menstrual purity from Leviticus.
